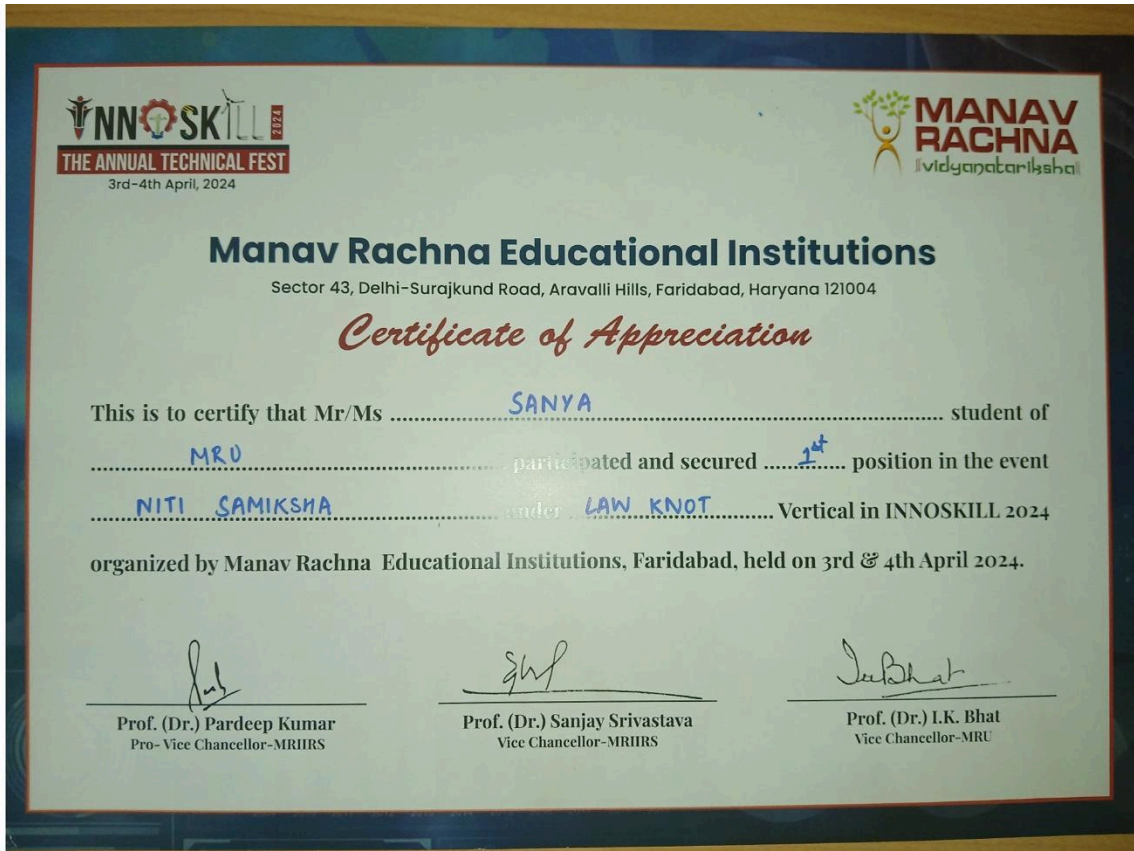


5.3.4 WOMEN’S APPLICATION IN UNDER-REPRESENTED SUBJECTS

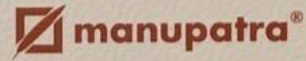

EVENT: ‘Give Her Wings to Fly’ Initiative

Topic: ‘Give Her Wings to Fly’ Initiative

On 24th September 2023, the Dr. O. P. Bhalla Foundation, in collaboration with student volunteers, carried forward its ongoing initiative “**Give Her Wings to Fly**” with an outreach activity in Mohabbatabad Village. This initiative, aimed at empowering women and promoting menstrual hygiene awareness, was conducted in partnership with the Satya Sai Foundation, which organized a Narayan Sewa for the villagers.

As part of the initiative, the team performed a **Nukkad Naatak** (street play) focusing on menstrual health, hygiene practices, and breaking social taboos surrounding menstruation. The interactive performance engaged the women and girls of the village, helping to communicate important health messages in an accessible and impactful manner.

In addition to the awareness activity, the Foundation team distributed **sanitary napkins to over 250 women and girls**, marking a cumulative total of **27,000 pads distributed** to date through this initiative. This effort reflects the Foundation’s sustained commitment to improving women’s health, education, and dignity in rural communities, while fostering awareness and behavioral change.

The activity not only educated and empowered the local community but also provided student volunteers an opportunity to actively participate in meaningful social initiatives, reinforcing the ethos of service, empathy, and leadership.



EVENT: Planning Meeting for Mammography Camps

Topic: Planning Meeting for Mammography Camps

Date: 11th October 2023

Venue: MR Campus

In line with its ongoing commitment to women's health and preventive care, the **Dr. O. P. Bhalla Foundation** convened a planning meeting on 11th October 2023 to strategize a series of Mammography and Health Camps for female MR Associates. The meeting was chaired by Dr. N. C. Wadhwa, and attended by prominent members including Brig. V. K. Anand, RJ Bhawna, Ms. Rakhi Pruthi (Head, CRC), and Dr. Vaishali Mathur, along with representatives from the Faridabad Industries Association Charitable Trust and Rotary Golfers Faridabad.

The meeting emphasized the importance of early detection and preventive healthcare for women, especially in a professional environment where health often takes a back seat. The participants reviewed previous camp outcomes, discussed challenges in reaching all female associates, and finalized a month-wise schedule to ensure maximum participation. Comprehensive health services, including mammography, blood pressure, blood sugar, thyroid, and cholesterol screenings, were planned along with medical consultations from qualified doctors.

It was collectively decided that the first camp would be held on 18th November 2023, with subsequent camps organized monthly on working Saturdays, creating a sustainable healthcare initiative. The meeting also included discussions on resource allocation, volunteer engagement, awareness campaigns, and partnerships with hospitals and NGOs to enhance the

impact of the camps. By laying down a structured framework, the Foundation aims to empower women associates to take charge of their health, while fostering a culture of wellness and preventive care across Manav Rachna Institutions.

This event was a part of the Foundation's ongoing efforts to engage, support, and inspire children from underprivileged backgrounds.

Volunteers from the Foundation, along with student and staff associates, distributed clothes, stationery, games, and dry food items such as biscuits and rusks to the children. The materials were generously collected through donations from MR students and associates, reflecting the collective spirit and social responsibility fostered within the institution.

The event also featured interactive games and talent showcases, allowing the children to actively participate and express themselves creatively. Their enthusiasm and joyful engagement made the day memorable for both the beneficiaries and the volunteers. Activities like these highlight the Foundation's commitment to holistic development and empowerment, demonstrating that our focus on gender and inclusion extends beyond a narrow definition, embracing children, adolescents, and all members of the community.

Collaborations and Partnerships

MRU strengthens its commitment through partnerships with NGOs, community organizations, and government initiatives that promote women in non-traditional fields. These collaborations achieve multiple objectives:

- **Capacity Building:** Workshops, bootcamps, and skill development programs prepare students for technical and leadership challenges.
- **Networking Opportunities:** Students connect with professionals, researchers, and leaders, gaining exposure to industry standards and career pathways.
- **Cultural Advocacy:** Through joint initiatives, MRU and its partners challenge local communities' perceptions about women in STEM, law, and management, cultivating an ecosystem of acceptance and encouragement.

For instance, joint programs with regional NGOs have enabled girls from rural and semi-urban areas to gain confidence in pursuing higher education in engineering and law, overcoming both economic and social hurdles.

Implications

Encouraging women in underrepresented fields reflects MRU's understanding that empowerment is both personal and societal. From a philosophical standpoint, the University's approach draws on:

- John Stuart Mill's advocacy for equality of opportunity, emphasizing that society flourishes only when all capable individuals are allowed to contribute fully.
- Martha Nussbaum's capability approach, focusing on creating substantive freedoms for women to achieve their potential.
- Feminist pedagogy, which integrates relational mentorship, experiential learning, and the dismantling of structural barriers.

Through these principles, MRU's interventions do not merely produce skilled graduates; they create transformative agents who are prepared to challenge inequity, innovate in their fields, and serve as role models for the next generation.

Outcomes and Impact

The tangible outcomes of MRU's initiatives include:

- Increased female enrolment in engineering, law, management, and technology programs.
- Enhanced student confidence and agency, reflected in participation in leadership roles, internships, and research projects.
- Community-level transformation, as outreach programs influence parents and local stakeholders to support girls' education.

A particularly notable example is the Margdarshan Career Aptitude sessions for GGSSS Old Faridabad students (November 21–22, 2023). Beyond introducing students to career possibilities, these sessions provided personalized counselling, empowering girls to envision futures in fields previously considered inaccessible. Such initiatives exemplify how mentorship, counselling, and outreach converge to break cycles of limited expectations and opportunity. MRU's commitment to encouraging women in underrepresented fields underscores a holistic vision of gender equality, where empowerment is both practical and philosophical. By integrating outreach, mentorship, partnerships, and role modelling, the University creates enabling environments that challenge stereotypes, cultivate skills, and foster resilience.

In doing so, MRU not only contributes to individual student success but also to the broader transformation of societal norms, reinforcing the principle that gender equality in education is inseparable from social justice and sustainable development. As Michelle Obama

emphasized, the future is brighter when women are empowered to lead, innovate, and excel—a principle that MRU actively embodies in every initiative.

Scholarships, remedial classes, summer and winter schools, and mentorship systems further illustrate that MRU's commitment is not superficial but structurally embedded. Women students are supported not only to enter competitive academic programs but to excel, innovate, and lead in every field they choose.

Awareness Programs

Awareness initiatives form the foundation of MRU's approach to gender sensitization. The Cell organizes seminars, workshops, and orientation sessions designed to challenge implicit biases, highlight systemic inequities, and cultivate empathy. For instance, the Expert Talk on "Inclusion and Gender Sensitization" held on July 23, 2024, by Dr. Shobhna Jeet from K.R. Mangalam University, explored the Indian Constitution's provisions on equality, particularly Articles 14, 15, and 16. Dr. Jeet emphasized the distinction between formal equality and equity, urging participants to consider contextual justice and the lived realities of marginalized groups. Such sessions do not merely impart information; they invite participants to critically examine their own assumptions and societal norms.

MRU extends awareness beyond formal lectures. Interactive sessions, poster competitions, and community engagement programs enable students to reflect creatively on the meaning of gender equality. These initiatives echo Paulo Freire's philosophy of education as praxis, where knowledge is co-constructed through dialogue and critical reflection rather than top-down instruction. The GSC functions as a strategic partner to university leadership in reviewing policies to ensure that institutional procedures do not inadvertently perpetuate gender bias. This includes examining recruitment practices, assessment criteria, and campus life regulations. By proactively identifying structural barriers, the GSC ensures that gender equality is not aspirational rhetoric but a practical, actionable reality.

For example, the Cell has collaborated with the administration to revise faculty recruitment policies, integrating gender-sensitive evaluation criteria. By doing so, MRU aligns with global best practices in higher education, emphasizing fairness, transparency, and equal opportunity.

Collaboration and Networking

The GSC actively engages with NGOs, government agencies, and academic institutions to broaden the scope of its initiatives. Collaborations allow MRU to share best practices, learn from external expertise, and engage students in community-based gender advocacy programs. This outward-looking approach reinforces the notion that gender sensitization is not confined to campus boundaries but extends into society, reflecting a holistic vision of education as a tool for social transformation. The GSC exemplifies a synergistic integration of ethical theory and institutional practice. It reflects feminist ethical principles, social justice imperatives, and educational philosophy, creating an ecosystem in which gender equality is actively cultivated

rather than passively assumed. By embedding gender sensitization into governance, MRU ensures that policies, pedagogy, and practice converge to produce a morally conscious and socially responsible academic community.

A practical illustration of the GSC's impact can be seen in initiatives like gender-neutral campus spaces, inclusive event planning, and legal literacy workshops. These interventions have tangible outcomes: enhanced student confidence, safer campus environments, and greater awareness of gender rights. Furthermore, the GSC's engagement with students, parents, and community stakeholders demonstrates MRU's commitment to systemic and intergenerational change, ensuring that empowerment extends beyond individual students to families and communities.

Complaint Resolution

A hallmark of MRU's governance framework is its transparent and confidential mechanism for handling grievances related to gender discrimination, harassment, or inequity. Complaints are processed through a multi-tiered redressal system, involving mentors, deans, and the GSC, ensuring confidentiality, accountability, and fairness.

Philosophically, this mechanism resonates with care ethics, which emphasizes relational responsibility, attentiveness, and the protection of vulnerable individuals. By institutionalizing a process that is both responsive and empathetic, MRU ensures that the university environment is safe, respectful, and conducive to learning for all students.

Gender Sensitization through Curriculum

“We cannot all succeed when half of us are held back.” – Malala Yousafzai

At Manav Rachna University (MRU), gender sensitization is not treated as a peripheral concern but as a central academic principle woven into the curriculum. Education, in MRU's philosophy, is a vehicle for cultivating ethical, socially aware, and intellectually competent individuals. In this framework, gender awareness is not a separate module or elective; rather, it permeates the pedagogical approach, shaping how students think, analyze, and engage with society.

The Philosophical Foundation of Curriculum-Based Gender Sensitization

MRU's integration of gender awareness into its curriculum draws on critical pedagogy and feminist theory, emphasizing that education is never neutral. Paulo Freire's concept of “conscientization”—developing a critical awareness of social, political, and economic contradictions—underpins MRU's approach. Students are encouraged to identify and question systemic inequalities, including gendered norms and biases that shape their communities, institutions, and personal identities.

Simone de Beauvoir's insight that "One is not born, but rather becomes, a woman" informs the curricular design. Courses are structured to explore how social structures, traditions, and institutional practices create gendered roles, while also examining strategies to dismantle these barriers. MRU's curriculum thus balances theoretical rigor with practical relevance, preparing students to apply critical perspectives in real-world contexts.

Curriculum Integration Across Schools

School of Education and Humanities

The School of Education and Humanities offers courses such as Gender, School, and Society, which critically analyze the role of education in perpetuating or challenging gender inequalities. Students explore topics including:

- Gendered stereotypes in classroom participation and assessment
- The impact of teacher expectations on student outcomes
- Peer interactions and socialization patterns that reinforce gender norms
- Strategies for creating inclusive pedagogical practices

By engaging in case studies, reflective assignments, and classroom simulations, students learn to identify inequities and design interventions. For instance, students may develop lesson plans that actively counter gender biases in content selection, language use, or classroom dynamics, bridging theory and practice.

School of Law

The School of Law emphasizes Gender Justice, a course examining constitutional, statutory, and international legal frameworks that protect women and marginalized groups. Key areas include:

- Constitutional guarantees of equality under Articles 14, 15, and 16
- Legal provisions addressing sexual harassment, domestic violence, and workplace discrimination
- Case law illustrating progressive interpretations of gender rights

Students critically analyze legal texts and real-life cases, fostering both legal literacy and ethical reasoning. Beyond classroom instruction, MRU organizes moot courts, debates, and workshops on POSH (Prevention of Sexual Harassment) compliance, providing students with hands-on experience in applying law to protect rights and promote equity.

School of Management and Commerce

Gender sensitization in management education focuses on leadership, organizational culture, and workplace equity. Courses integrate:

- Gendered dynamics in corporate structures

- Negotiation and communication strategies for women leaders
- Policies for diversity, equity, and inclusion in organizational settings

Practical exercises include group projects analyzing companies' gender policies, evaluating leadership styles, and designing equity-driven organizational interventions. This ensures that graduates enter the professional world equipped to foster inclusive work environments, not just as compliant participants but as active change agents.

Experiential and Interdisciplinary Approaches

MRU emphasizes experiential learning to complement theoretical understanding. Students participate in:

- **Workshops on unconscious bias**, helping them recognize personal assumptions and their impact on interactions
- **Community projects**, such as awareness campaigns on women's education, child marriage, and gender-based violence
- **Cross-disciplinary collaborations**, where students from engineering, law, and management jointly tackle issues like workplace harassment, gender-inclusive design, or equitable technology solutions

This interdisciplinary, hands-on approach ensures that gender sensitization is not abstract, but a lived and actionable competence.

Examples of Curriculum Impact

MRU's curricular interventions have produced tangible outcomes:

1. Students from the School of Law have successfully advocated for POSH compliance in internships and community legal aid clinics.
2. Education students have implemented gender-sensitive pedagogy in partner schools, reshaping teaching practices to foster inclusion.
3. Management graduates have developed diversity-driven organizational strategies adopted in startups and NGOs, demonstrating the practical transfer of curriculum knowledge.

Additionally, MRU's career aptitude and counseling programs—such as the Margadarshan initiative for GGSSS Old Faridabad students (Nov 21–22, 2023)—complement curricular efforts by aligning gender-sensitive guidance with career choices, empowering young women to pursue fields traditionally dominated by men.

Philosophical Implications

MRU's curriculum-centered approach reflects a holistic understanding of education as social transformation:

- It nurtures critical consciousness, enabling students to recognize injustice and take corrective action.
- It fosters ethical reasoning, connecting individual responsibility with societal accountability.
- It prepares students to challenge systemic inequality, ensuring that education contributes not only to personal advancement but to social justice and sustainable development.

In the words of Malala Yousafzai, “We cannot all succeed when half of us are held back.” By embedding gender sensitization into the core of academic life, MRU ensures that all students—male and female—are equipped to succeed, contribute, and lead in an equitable society. MRU’s approach to curriculum-based gender sensitization exemplifies education as empowerment. By integrating theory, practice, and experiential learning, the University ensures that gender awareness becomes an intellectual habit and a moral compass. Students emerge not only as skilled professionals but as socially conscious citizens, ready to advocate for equity and inclusivity in every sphere of life.

Through these curricular interventions, MRU demonstrates that academic rigor and social responsibility are inseparable, and that gender equality is both an educational objective and a societal imperative.

6. Campus and Community Engagement: Awareness and Action

At Manav Rachna University (MRU), gender sensitization is not confined to the classroom. The University recognizes that true transformation occurs when awareness translates into action, extending into campus life, community outreach, and social engagement. MRU’s philosophy emphasizes that students must not only understand inequality intellectually but also practice inclusivity and advocacy in real-world contexts. Through structured programs, workshops, competitions, and collaborative initiatives, the University ensures that gender equality becomes a lived experience rather than a theoretical ideal.

Philosophical Foundations of Engagement

MRU’s engagement strategy draws upon pragmatic humanism and civic ethics, grounded in the belief that education’s moral responsibility extends beyond academic mastery. Drawing on John Dewey’s principle that education and experience are intimately connected, MRU positions students as active participants in shaping an equitable society.

The University also engages feminist ethics, emphasizing relational responsibility, empathy, and social justice. Students are encouraged to reflect on their own positionality and privilege, understand structural inequities, and develop ethical responsiveness toward marginalized communities. This pedagogical philosophy informs every campus and community initiative, ensuring that MRU’s engagement is purposeful, reflective, and transformative.

Structured Campus Initiatives

Gender Sensitization Sessions

One landmark session, conducted on July 13, 2023, by Ms. Reshma, a developmental psychologist, exemplifies MRU's experiential approach. In this session, students explored:

- Implicit gender biases and their impact on interpersonal and institutional interactions
- Strategies to develop socio-emotional intelligence, fostering empathy and inclusion
- The importance of reflective practice, encouraging students to challenge internalized stereotypes

Participants were guided to identify subtle patterns of discrimination in everyday life, from classroom dynamics to peer relationships. The session concluded with collaborative exercises where students proposed practical interventions to promote inclusivity on campus.

Creative Advocacy: Competitions and Campaigns

MRU combines artistic expression with social activism to amplify gender awareness. For example, the Poster Making Competition on SDG 5, organized on September 10, 2023, provided students with a platform to visualize their commitment to women's empowerment. Participants:

- Interpreted the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals through creative visual narratives
- Highlighted local and global challenges to gender equality
- Advocated solutions using art as a medium for dialogue and reflection

By merging creativity with advocacy, MRU nurtures emotional engagement and ethical reflection, enabling students to connect personally with the principles of equality and justice.

Twilight Talks: Unheard Stories of Women

On October 23, 2024, the School of Management and Commerce, in collaboration with Women with Wings and National Network Today, organized Twilight Talks: Unheard Stories of Women. This initiative showcased the experiences of women and transwomen navigating professional spaces, emphasizing resilience, leadership, and the ongoing struggle for recognition.

Speakers such as Ms. Ruchika Beri, Ms. Rani Patel, and Ms. Shivamya shared:

- Challenges of gender bias in corporate, academic, and legal spheres
- Strategies for overcoming systemic barriers
- The importance of mentorship, networking, and advocacy

By providing first-hand narratives, MRU enabled students to internalize the lived realities of marginalized groups, fostering empathy and inspiring advocacy beyond the classroom.

Workshops on Workplace Safety and Legal Awareness

The Workshop on POSH Awareness and Prevention, conducted on October 22, 2024, by the School of Law in collaboration with the Gender Sensitization Cell (GSC), exemplifies MRU's practical engagement. Led by Advocate Prerna Arora, students gained:

- Detailed understanding of the Prevention of Sexual Harassment (POSH) Act
- Practical strategies for identifying, reporting, and addressing harassment
- Ethical guidance for creating safe, respectful, and accountable organizational cultures

The workshop not only increased legal literacy but also cultivated a culture of responsibility, ensuring that students could serve as proactive agents of change in future workplaces.

Community Outreach: Extending Impact Beyond Campus

MRU recognizes that gender sensitization extends into the surrounding community. The University collaborates with NGOs, schools, and local organizations, addressing systemic barriers to women's education and empowerment. Notably, the Margadarshan initiative, held on November 21–22, 2023, engaged 98 students from Government Girls Senior Secondary School (GGSSS), Old Faridabad, providing:

- Career aptitude assessments to identify strengths and interests
- Personalized counseling from MRU's Career Development Center (CDC)
- Guidance on academic and career options, fostering informed decision-making

This outreach exemplifies MRU's commitment to social responsibility, demonstrating that campus initiatives are deeply intertwined with community transformation and youth empowerment.

Multi-Level Impact and Evaluation

MRU ensures that engagement programs are evaluated and refined through:

- Student feedback and reflective assessments
- Follow-up sessions to track the implementation of learned strategies
- Collaboration with external experts to measure long-term societal impact

These measures ensure that awareness leads to tangible action, reinforcing the University's philosophy that education must empower students as agents of social change.

MRU's engagement initiatives embody Aristotelian notions of praxis: the idea that knowledge must translate into ethical action. By combining awareness, reflection, and active participation, the University nurtures students who are not only cognitively competent but also morally and socially responsible.

The programs also resonate with bell hooks' principle that education is the practice of freedom, equipping students to critically challenge oppressive systems and contribute to a

more equitable society. Engagement thus becomes both a pedagogical strategy and a moral imperative, reinforcing MRU's holistic commitment to gender equality.
